PROGRAM NOTES

Bertolt Brecht (1898-1956) was one of the theatrical giants of the modern theatre. His theories, which have added such terms as "epic theatre" and "alienation effect" to the vocabulary of the theatre, have had considerable effect upon the theatre's present day alienation from realism. He advocated an anti-realistic, non-illusionistic style of theatre which makes little attempt to deceive the audience into believing that it is witnessing "life." Instead, the audience is constantly reminded that it is witnessing "theatre." In a Brecht play, the characters break into song, talk directly to the audience, break character and comment on the action, use asides and soliloquies, and perform in an acting style that can best be described as "theatrical." The acting style is complemented by a non-illusionistic scenic mode which includes the use of projections, motion pictures, and all manner of graphic-arts to forward the idea of the play.

His plays are poetic parables, concerned mainly with showing how hard it is to be good in a world ruled by greed, selfishness, and violence. In "The Good Woman of Setzuan," first produced in Europe in 1943, reason and emotion appear as separate and contradictory aspects of the same personality. Since ruin is the result of being wholly good, the ruthless, hard-boiled, rational part of human nature takes command. This negativism, however, is balanced somewhat by a question in the epilogue, "Can the world be changed?" and Brecht's answer, "There must, there must, there's got to be a way."

 - 1918 "Baal," first play written in four days
- 1919-22 Studied medicine and natural sciences at Munich University
 - 1920 "Dramaturg" at Munich Chamber Theatre
 - 1922 Producer and "dramaturg" at Max Reinhardt's "Deutsches Theatre," Berlin
- 1927-28-32 "A Man's a Man," "Threepenny Opera," "St. Joan of the Stockyards"
- 1933-47 Exile (Czechoslovakia, France, Sweden, Finland, Soviet Union, U.S.A.)
- 1938-40 "The Good Woman of Setzuan" (Originally a poem recited by Brecht at Dresden State Theatre)
 - 1939 "Mother Courage and Her Children"
 - 1941 Settles in U.S.A. "The Resistible Rise of Arturo Ui"
 - 1943 "Life of Galileo," produced at Coronet Theatre in Hollywood, Charles Laughton played Galileo
- 1944-45 "The Caucasian Chalk Circle"
 - 1947 Return to Europe (Zurich)
 - 1948 General Intendant of the Deutsches Theater Berlin, foundation of the Berliner Ensemble. "Herr Puntila and his Man Matti." "A Little Organum for the Theatre"
 - 1956 Died in Berlin on 14th August
