program notes

The production you are about to witness is a product of the American Educational Theatre, where research into the past aids us in our search for a better understanding of the present.

COMMEDIA DELL'ARTE

In all theatrical history there has never been a dramatic style like the *commedia*. Performed in full slapstick, with stylized costumes and masks, the *commedia* emphasizes certain universal character types, composed mostly of old men, lovers, and zanies or servants, all of which were portrayed to the point of caricature.

With the beginning of the Renaissance in Italy, small bands of strolling players moved from town to town in

search of whatever audience they could find. Performing out-of-doors, in city squares and market places, they depended upon the sheer vitality and attractiveness of their improvisational playing to complel non-captive audiences to pay attention, and to pay for that attention. When a company of actors depends upon such a chancy means of livelihood, it is obvious that they must truly please. That many famous *commedia* companies did just that for several hundred years is proof of the vitality of the genre.

Our group, The Affamati Company (The Hungry Ones), pretends to be one of these companies, and as such competes in the free market of entertainment for your approval and favor.

THE SCENARIO

A reading of late Medieval and early Renaissance history, undertaken at the beginning of the Fall term by the members of The Affamati Company, revealed such a close parallel between university life then and now that the group felt impelled to draw those parallels to the attention of our audiences. Accordingly, a research project was begun which resulted in this presentation of the original scenario, "A Gap in Generations."

The scenario itself was created by the members of the company in the manner of the *commedia*, all lines and business being improvisationally evolved in rehearsal and performance.

COMMEDIA TERMS

Lazzi-Comic turns or gags.

Maestro-The leader of a commedia dell'arte company.

Scenario—A plot outline, scene by scene, posted in the wings, from which the actors take their directions.

Zanni-A comic servant.

Zibaldoni—An actor's notebook of lazzi, oftentimes handed down from one generation of actors to another.
